THE EASTER STORY ACCORDING TO JOHN'S GOSPEL

John 20. 1 — 18

Read it first, from your own favorite Bible translation. Then, from "the Message":

- **1-2** Early in the morning on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone was moved away from the entrance. She ran at once to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, breathlessly panting, "They took the Master from the tomb. We don't know where they've put him."
- **3-10** Peter and the other disciple left immediately for the tomb. They ran, neck and neck. The other disciple got to the tomb first, outrunning Peter. Stooping to look in, he saw the pieces of linen cloth lying there, but he didn't go in. Simon Peter arrived after him, entered the tomb, observed the linen cloths lying there, and the kerchief used to cover his head not lying with the linen cloths but separate, neatly folded by itself. Then the other disciple, the one who had gotten there first, went into the tomb, took one look at the evidence, and believed. No one yet knew from the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead. The disciples then went back home.
- **11-13** But Mary stood outside the tomb weeping. As she wept, she knelt to look into the tomb and saw two angels sitting there, dressed in white, one at the head, the other at the foot of where Jesus' body had been laid. They said to her, "Woman, why do you weep?"
- **13-14** "They took my Master," she said, "and I don't know where they put him." After she said this, she turned away and saw Jesus standing there. But she didn't recognize him.
- **15** Jesus spoke to her, "Woman, why do you weep? Who are you looking for?" She, thinking that he was the gardener, said, "Mister, if you took him, tell me where you put him so I can care for him."
- 16 Jesus said, "Mary."

Turning to face him, she said in Hebrew, "Rabboni!" meaning "Teacher!"

- 17 Jesus said, "Don't cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go to my brothers and tell them, 'I ascend to my Father and your Father, my God and your God."
- **18** Mary Magdalene went, telling the news to the disciples: "I saw the Master!" And she told them everything he said to her.

THREE EASTER MEDITATIONS

"For God so Loved the World"

I relate to John in the New Testament. Over the years I have experienced how much God loves me, and I think that is what John learned early on in his walk with Jesus. I've heard some say John was conceited since he always called himself "the disciple whom Jesus loved", but I think he just knew the truth about God's love.

With that as an introduction, allow me to view the events of Good Friday and Easter Sunday through his eyes.

He was there when they arrested Jesus. He was scared, hurt, and confused. How could they do this to the Son of God? Didn't they know how much He loved them? As events marched on out of John's control, he was concerned for the Son of God. He was never far from where Jesus was as he was tried in the kangaroo court of those "in power". John might have been there when Jesus was before Pilate. He might have seen Pilate's surprise that Jesus didn't respond as others had when faced with certain death. The others pleaded not to die, or they defiantly told the authorities where they could go. But Jesus...

Throughout this day, John knew the real reason Jesus was silent. He knew the soft crying that Jesus was doing had nothing to do with the wounds put upon him by the soldiers. It had nothing to do with the crown of thorns that was forced upon his head. John realized that Jesus was crying because His heart was broken. John knew that the Son of God had come to let people know God loved them, to let them experience the love of God. He knew that because he had experienced it. Jesus had already said all that could be said. If they didn't believe Him while He was ministering the Love of God to them, they would not understand or believe what He might say immediately before He went to the cross.

And so John, with a heavy heart stayed by his friend until the end. He even heard Jesus tell him to take care of Mary. And then He was gone. "It is finished" and then... nothing. All that love, gone, just like that! Would God ever visit us again? Did we just blow the only chance we had to see God, love God, and be loved by God? Now what?

I imagine John was there when they buried Jesus in that borrowed tomb. It was nice of Joseph to give his tomb to Jesus. At least he had a good burial. Now what?

Going back to the disciples and meeting with them as they were all depressed and in shock. It had all seemed so real! But now.... All of the sudden, the atmosphere in the room changed. There was a sweet smell in the room. Not the smell of fear, and sweat, but a pleasant odor. And there He was! "Peace be with you." John immediately recognized Jesus, and realized that the love of God was even greater than he imagined it could be.

The surprise wasn't so much that Jesus rose from the grave, after all didn't God make the universe? How hard would the resurrection of a body be compared to that? The real surprise was God saying, "Whatever you have done, whatever you throw at Me, I love you." John knew he was loved before, but this took him deeper into that love.

May the Lord bless you as you meditate on these things today. Larry

"THE GREATEST ACT OF LOVE"

There is a song the Bee Gees sang, "Back in the day," as my children like to say. In this particular song, the following lyrics appear:

You don't know what it's like
To love somebody
To love somebody
The way I love you.

God's love for us is so intense, the son of God, Jesus Christ put it on full display on a cross at Golgotha. He surrendered his life. This was followed by an interment in a tomb for three days. On the third day he was brought forth in glorious resurrection power, past the cherubim with the fire branding sword, past the Garden of Eden, past the heavenly Tabernacle, into the very heart of God, our final dwelling place.

God our creator has prepared humanity for this great event. You see, resurrection themes abound. They surround us.

Every month we witness the lunar phases: no moon in the sky; to a full moon; back to no moon. Those living by the ocean experience two low tides and two high tides every lunar day. The whole world encounters morning light turned into evening darkness and back to light every 24 hours. Each day our bodies experience a form of resurrection too. Our lungs fill up and then empty out with air every time we breathe. Our hearts take in blood and then are emptied of it with each heartbeat. We even experience mini resurrections every morning as we awaken from the previous night's sleep.

We see this theme of death and resurrection every time a seed is planted. It dies in order to release the germ. Then it sprouts, grows, and reproduces a thousand fold. Harvest comes. The multifold results of the planted seed provides sustenance for the living.

God's love is so intense, fearful, mysterious, and wonderful all at the same time. Have you allowed yourself to experience such glorious, fearful, and intense passionate love? Let God love you! Who are you? You are God's beloved. The subject (not object) of his love. His love is for you and is directed towards you. Crucify your "no" and accept his resurrected, "yes!"

All these mini resurrections point to the one true resurrection of and in Jesus Christ. We too will be resurrected someday. Celebrate his today and he will celebrate yours at the appointed time.

There's plenty enough darkness. Be the Light! Resurrection Light!

He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Amen.
